"We are collecting this information just in case of a true emergency. There will be a limited number of copies in sealed envelopes, only to be opened in life or death situations. We need your personal cell phone and that of a family member or contact. We hope you understand that if we are using this list, there is something seriously wrong."

Identifying Active Shooter Situations

Really?

Develop a code word system for family notification – "oranges, oranges. I am fine."

The Active Shooter Conversation

Spouse: Hello.

You: Honey – I am OK, but we had an active shooter situation at work. Spouse: What?

You: I am OK, but we have an active shooter situation.

Spouse: Where? Are you OK?

You: Yes, I am OK, I'm fine, I have to go.

Spouse: Where is the shooter? Whatever, I am coming to you right now.

You: Listen – I just wanted you to be aware – I am OK, but when you hear it on the news I did not want you to panic. Take the kids to soccer practice and I will call you or text once I have more information. The police want to ask me questions, now . . . Bye.

RASHDY – Reacting to an Active Shooter

- Run Away Don't Die A Hero
- Safely Hide
 - Stay Hidden
 - Stay Silent
 - Stay Locked-In/Barricaded
 - Be Patient
- Defend Yourself

Leadership Response

- Prepare but be "Present"
- Care for associates
- Give everyone talking points
